I also notice the lack of E-911 numbers to identify residences. Some homes have easy to find numbers, however, many are fading, and some are missing parts of the numbers while other locations are unmarked. Your E-911 number is tremendously important. It is a major component of the most important detail emergency services uses during a time of crisis. In a time where every second counts, don't you want to assist by having your E-911 number properly displayed and seen? Ultimately, it not only helps locate you but your neighbors too.

Every residence and camp have been assigned an E-911 number. If you do not know what your E-911 number is, please contact the town office. Your assigned number should be displayed on a post, fence, wall, mailbox or some structure easily visible from the road. Because emergency services could respond from either direction on a road, make sure your number can be seen from either direction. This includes placing numbers on both sides of your mailbox. Numbers should contrast with the background and be at least 4 inches in height.

Next time you leave your house, please double check your numbers. In a time where seconds count, properly displayed numbers may save a life, even your own life. Becky Hapgood
