Hello, and welcome to the Main Event! In this corner, sporting a healthy weight of actual factual tons and wanting nothing more than to go about their day is the nameless, faceless, & unwilling participant known only as Home.

And in this corner, weighing in at a meager 3 pounds, we have one of the most notorious arsonists of the last 3 decades. The Earl of Embers, The Duke of Displacement, The King of Conflagration; Mr. Space Heater!

This situation happens far too often and since it's begun to cool off, I thought it may be beneficial to go over some simple heat safety. Such a wonderful world that we live in that we can create warmth with the press of a button or by plugging a cord in. In all seriousness, though, do not neglect portable heaters, run them too long, or place them near any combustibles (give at least 3 feet around the device). What common items in your living room could ignite? A blanket. A pillow. Furniture. Curtains. Books. Paper. Paneling. A stuffed toy. Sometimes even the carpet itself. All I'm saying is plan accordingly and stay alert. When it comes to electric appliances even the cord & plug assembly itself can get superheated, which is why they are designed to be plugged directly into the wall outlet. This goes for air & deep fryers, slow cookers, and toasters, too. Power strips (extension cords with multiple outlet slots) or surge protectors can be useful for getting all your devices powered simultaneously but most do not protect you from the effects of overheating. The easiest way to determine if your unit is equipped for the job is if it contains a replaceable fuse. The fuse is designed to burn out and cut the power supply if it gets too hot. That simple failsafe mechanism could be all that stands between a "normal" life or trying to piece it back together after losing everything. Yes, accidents happen every day, but if there's something so simple that you could do to minimize the possibility of catastrophe, would you?

As a community, we have witnessed too many times the horror, sadness, and tragedy of house fires. If this piece motivates even ONE of you into evaluating your own power strip tactics or making sure there are no combustibles around a space heater, then I will have considered this a complete success! In closing, I enjoy seeing each and every one of you in the office, but I would rather not meet anyone under the circumstances of rebuilding their home or their life. Please, stay safe out there. REMINDER:



YOU <u>MUST</u> BRING IN YOUR **PREVIOUS REGISTRATION** WHEN REGISTERING ATVS,SNOWMOBILES AND BOATS AT THE TOWN OFFICE.

DID YOU KNOW? ANY VETERAN WHO:

- Has a <u>permanent</u> disability that is service-related;
- Presents paperwork indicating the veteran is either <u>100% disabled</u> or being <u>compensated at 100%;</u>
- Is a titled owner or lessee of the vehicle;
- That disabled veteran is entitled to a free registration, title fee exemption and an automatic excise exemption on <u>one</u> vehicle.

Sales tax and any vanity fees apply.

Disabled Veteran plates are available at any BMV branch office.
Veterans who qualify are entitled to the excise exemption on any one license plate class if they do not choose to have a DV, VX or XV plate.



Small 'Backyard' Farm Workshop China Town Office Portable Building March 13th 4-5:30 PM (with March 14th snow date)

This workshop is geared towards small scale, "backyard" farms in the China Lake region who are interested in improving the health and sustainability of their natural resources. The talk will focus on water quality issues commonly found on small farms, best management practices for managing these issues and programs that provide financial and technical assistance to implement these practices. At the workshop, Jeff Dennis from Maine Department of Environmental Protection (MDEP) will be speaking about common water quality issues arising from small farms and the best management practices to address these issues. Chuck Penny from Maine Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will be showcasing NRCS programs that provide costshare and technical assistance for the installation of these practices. **Interested participants can register for this free workshop via email** *laura.lecker@me.nacdnet.net* or by calling Dale at the Kennebec Soil and Water Conservation District Office at 480-3927.

The Town of China is offering an E911 sign displaying your house number. Who is funding this, you ask? The project was approved by voters at the June 14, 2022 Election, Article 31, to use up to \$38,000 of ARPA funds to purchase the signs for China residents. Residents must complete an order form. Forms are available at the town office and online at www.china.govoffice.com. Forms can be returned to the town office, mailed or emailed to info@chinamaine.org. One sign per residence. Once the funding is exhausted, the project ends so please order soon. Orders will be combined to create bulk orders for cost reduction therefore it may take serval weeks to receive the sign. Installation of the sign is the property owner's responsibility. You will be notified when your sign is available to be picked up at the China Town Office during normal business hours.
